Emphasis is on Writing in Every Classroom

Writing is a pivotal form of communication. Most academic institutions make writing an important part of the curriculum; and in the classrooms at Cheektowaga Central, the story is no different. We know that improving students' writing skills helps them succeed inside and outside of the classroom. One of the district's academic goals for the 2018-19 school year is to improve the quality and quantity of writing in each classroom. Our aim is for all of our students to become competent readers and writers by the time they graduate.

To ensure all students are ready for success after high school, the Common Core State Standards establish clear, consistent guidelines for what it means to be a literate person prepared for success in the 21st century. The skills and knowledge captured in the ELA/literacy standards help prepare students for life outside the classroom. They aim to develop students' higher order and critical-thinking skills. The act of writing "helps students get their thinking out in the open where it can be assessed and refined" (Silver, Dewey, Perini, 2012, p. 50).

Over the summer, a group of K-8 teachers began the process of assessing the District's writing curriculum and identifying the specific strategies that writers undertake to carry out components of *continued on page 5*

and student level. Every decision we make must address one of these three priorities: inspiring a high level of learning for all; the development of the whole child; and creating opportunities to enhance 21st century skills.

Inspire a High Level of Learning for All

Reading and writing remain a constant focus in all buildings. We are continuing our work with Dr. Harvey Silver, Dr. Jim Knight and Dr. Marcia Tate in providing teachers with engaging instructional strategies to increase student learning and academic rigor.

Our partnership with Buffalo State College to move instruction in mathematics K-12 to a higher level has benefited students and teachers this fall.

Erie 1 BOCES, Instructional Coaching, teacher mentors and building based coaches continue to support and improve instruction. We are getting better!

The Whole Child

The District Pupil Personnel Services team has begun the process of working with the University at Buffalo Institute on Trauma Informed Care in Schools. One of the primary focus areas at our March Professional Learning Day will be on mental health awareness and the social / emotional development of the whole child.

A weeklong Institute on Restorative Practices was offered to administrators and teachers this summer, and training continues throughout the school year. You may see restorative circles implemented at the Elementary School, conversations about repairing the harm at the Middle and High schools. Already discipline referrals have decreased.

21st Century Skills

Chromebooks have been rolled out to every K-12 teacher as phase one of our 1:1 technology initiative has been completed.

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Community Circles Promote Positivity



On Monday, the first day back from Thanksgiving break, Union East Elementary School teachers were back in the routine with their daily Community Circles. Students eagerly shared their feelings ratings and special stories. Community Circles are another way teachers at Central build positive relationships and help cultivate a positive learning environment.

Middle School teachers also conduct Community Circles. Recently Mr. Skierczynski used a Community Circle for a math lesson with his fifthgraders. Every student participated in a group discussion and collaborated to solve a word problem. In Mrs. Braddock's sixth-grade classroom, a daily Community Circle took the form of a quick check-in on each student after returning from lunch. Students discussed specific respectful behaviors that they had demonstrated so far that day and additional ways that they could show respect throughout the rest of the day.

These are some of the many ways that we continue to cultivate an environment that promotes positive behaviors and opportunities for learning for all of our students.

Promoting the Positive

Project Positive is our district-wide initiative that focuses on creating and cultivating a positive learning environment for all students. Over the years, great things are continuing to happen in each building to promote and encourage positive behaviors, thereby increasing opportunities for learning.

Union East Elementary School has incorporated Community Circles into their daily classroom routines. During this time, students share their "feelings rating" and have the option to share the reason for their rating. This allows the teacher each day to get a good sense of how all of their students are feeling and insight into why they may be feeling that way. Students have the opportunity to provide each other a little extra support when needed and to celebrate each other as a class community. In these Community Circles, students learn important social skills, such as how to greet their peers respectfully, make eye contact when communicating, and actively listen to others.

At the Middle School, the PTA runs a school-wide Warrior Way Store every other week near the cafeteria. Students bring Warrior Way tickets they earned for following the 5Bs to the store and spend them on up to three items each time they shop. The store is stocked with school supplies, water bottles, toiletries, backpacks, books, stickers, lanyards, coloring books, holiday themed items, and small gift items. Oftentimes students think of others and purchase items for friends and family members when they want to give them something special.



The High School acknowledgement system now includes three tickets. In the past students would receive a "Solid as a Rock" ticket from a teacher for demonstrating any of the 5Bs. Now high school students can earn three tickets. White tickets may be earned for following the 5Bs at a more advanced level; red for monthly Pop-Up Contests rewarding demonstrating the monthly target behavior or participating in the monthly character activity; and blue tickets are for meeting the Universal Scholar Menu criteria, which includes turning in assignments on time, improving a class or overall average, and not being tardy.

These are just a few examples of the many ways as a district we are "promoting the positive." As the school year progresses, and in the years to come, as a district we will continue to promote and encourage positive behaviors to increase opportunities for academic success and personal growth for all students.




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Staff Learns More about Mental Health

the writing process. The team structured a plan to carry out the recommendation to explicitly teach strategies for the writing process, including planning and goal setting,



drafting, evaluating, revising, and editing. This is just the beginning of our task to guide our students to write more effectively.

Superintendent Mary Morris has charged every teacher districtwide to improve the quality and quantity of writing in each classroom. She invites parents and guardians to ask their children to share their writing, and continue to encourage them to make visible their thinking using whatever writing format or tool they choose. Don't hesitate to ask your child's teacher for tools or strategies to increase the support of writing in and out of the classroom.

To guide our work, district teachers and administrators are studying "The Core Six: Essential Strategies for Achieving Excellence with the Common Core" (Silver, Dewing, Perini, 2012). Any parent or guardian who desires a copy of the text may request it by emailing mgeorge@ccsd-k12.net.

our students will be prepared for college and/or the workforce as they graduate from Cheektowaga Central.








Mrs. Reeb's Class Rewarded for Being Active
