Unified Sports

Understanding Unified Sports

Unified Sports® is a registered program of Special Olympics that combines approximately equal numbers of athletes with and without intellectual disability on sports teams for training and competition. All Unified Sports® players, both athletes and special partners, are of similar age and matched sport skill ability. Unified Sports® teams are placed in competitive divisions based on their skill abilities, and range from training divisions (with a skill-learning focus) to high level competition. Besides providing a similar competitive experience to regular school interscholastic sport opportunities players will also gain physical fitness, develop friendships and demonstrate appreciation and respect for each other both on and off the playing field.

Project unify is made up of three main components:

- 1. Inclusive Sports combines athletes (players with intellectual disabilities) and athletes to create athletic teams for training and competition. Participation is rooted in the principle of meaningful involvement which ensures that every player is given an opportunity to contribute to the success of his or her team through their unique skills. Inclusive activity is among the most conducive ways to break down stereotypes and foster relationships.
- 2. Youth Leadership & Advocacy provides students with and without intellectual disabilities opportunities to take on leadership roles in promoting Project Unify activities in their schools and in their communities. Our school has participated the entire month of February in spreading the word to end the R word. We showed

- videos and hung posters throughout the month to encourage students to stop using the 'R' word. On March 1st students had the opportunity to pledge to end using the 'R' word
- 3. Whole-School Engagement provides opportunities for all students to participate in school-wide campaigns and activities such as Fans in the Stands, Pledge and Plunge, and the R-word Campaign. We will be hosting senior night for our athletes and a teacher appreciation night to encourage more staff to come out and watch our basketball team.

We are excited to have unified basketball here at CCHS and look forward to seeing your student on the court.

Unified Leadership

In an inspiring achievement for the Cheektowaga community, students Angelo Sanetick and Victoria Deane have been selected to represent Cheektowaga, Western New York, the ECIC league, and Section IV as ambassadors for Special Olympics North America. Congratulations to Angelo Sanetick and Victoria Deane on this well-deserved recognition.



Introducing Our New Special Olympics Training Club

This year, the Unified Leadership program will establish their traditional Special Olympic training club. This decision stemmed from two main goals:

- 1. Provide an opportunity for all students with disabilities to be able to train and compete in various events and not worry about the game atmosphere. The goal is to get more athletes signed up with Special Olympics so they can continue training after high school. Our students currently train once a week during 9th period.
