Three and Four Year Old FULL-DAY Universal Pre-Kindergarten Program for the 2025-2026 School Year (Pending State Funding)

The Cheektowaga Central School District is proud to offer its Universal Pre-Kindergarten Program for the 2025-2026 school year starting in September. The program is open to district residents whose children will be three or four years of age on or before December 1, 2025. Students are selected by lottery to participate in the District's UPK Program. Parents are responsible for transporting their child to and from the program. Based on anticipated state funding, the district is accepting applications for the 2025-2026 UPK Program. UPK 4 program: Union East Elementary, 3550 Union Road

UPK registration begins March 3rd and must be completed by May 9th to be eligible for the UPK Lottery Draw. UPK registrations after the Lottery Draw will be ongoing. Once the program is filled, registered students will be added to the UPK program waitlist.



We have partnered with Be Your Own Hero to help students develop career readiness skills in the classroom, as well as through their culminating event, the Skilled Trades Fair, held at Buffalo RiverWorks. to attend the fair and the NACAC College Fair at the Buffalo Convention Center to explore opportunities beyond high school. Students can also sign up for individual college campus visits in the fall and spring to schools in our area. Additionally, they can attend the WNY College Consortium, which brings more than 20 college and university representatives to our gym to provide valuable information.

We also hosted a presenter from Northland Workforce Training Center to speak with our 12th graders about sought-after trade training programs and the jobs they help students connect with. A follow-up trip to Northland's facility is planned for spring for those who wish to apply. For students interested in the building trades or construction field, we took a trip in October to the Operating Engineers Training Center, where students gained hands-on experience operating heavy machinery and learned how to obtain employment in this field. There is also a Women in Construction event in the spring that highlights the importance of female representation in the construction industry.

In addition to postsecondary planning, we offer volunteer opportunities during the school day for students to earn community service hours toward their graduation requirement. Students can participate in Meals on Wheels of WNY or assist at Feedmore WNY Food Bank to give back to the community and recognize the importance of helping others.

Law Enforcement Field Trip to Cheektowaga Police Station

The Cheektowaga Law Enforcement class recently had the unique opportunity to visit the Cheektowaga Police Station and experience firsthand what it's like behind the scenes of law enforcement operations. This field trip built on an in-class mock trial that students conducted prior to the visit. During the trial, students assumed roles of attorneys, witnesses, and jurors, engaging in the judicial process in a handson way. For many, this was their first exposure to courtroom procedures, making it an invaluable learning experience.

The visit to the police station was a natural extension of the activity. Students sat in the courtroom where



real cases are heard, connecting their mock trial experience to an authentic courtroom setting. Walking through the station, they gained insights into law enforcement operations, from the dispatch center to the holding cells. The visit reinforced the connection between classroom learning and real-world law enforcement practices.

Black History Month

Black History Month can be traced back to 1926, when it was founded by Carter G. Woodson, who created a week to encourage Black students to learn about their heritage. During the Civil Rights Movement of the 1960s, Black History Week was expanded into Black History Month. In 1976, President Ford officially designated February as Black History Month. February was chosen because it is the birth month of both Abraham Lincoln and Frederick Douglass.

The theme for Black History Month 2025 is "African Americans and Labor." The theme specifically aims to recognize the role African Americans have played in the workforce, whether paid or unpaid. The focus can range from vocational studies and entrepreneurship to organized labor's role in fighting for economic and social justice, as well as government and public service.

2025 marks the 100th anniversary of the creation of the Brotherhood of Sleeping Car Porters and Maids by labor organizer and civil rights activist A. Philip Randolph, the first Black union to receive a charter in the American Federation of Labor. Martin Luther King Jr. incorporated issues outlined by Randolph's March on Washington Movement, such as economic justice, into the Poor People's Campaign, which he established in 1967 (Association for the Study of African American Life and History – ASALH).

History of Western New York Field Trips

History of Western New York students had two opportunities to explore the region this past semester.

In October, students explored downtown Buffalo's architecture on a walking tour. They began at Buffalo City Hall, learning about its art-deco style and Native American symbolism. Students walked to Niagara Square, where they observed the McKinley Monument, the Statler, and both the old and new courthouses. The tour continued to Old County Hall, where President McKinley lay in state after his death in 1901. The



group then visited the Guaranty Building, known for how its architects incorporated nature into its design. Across the street stood St. Paul's Cathedral, built in 1907, where students toured its interior to admire its architecture. The final stops on the tour included the Ellicott Square Building and Hotel Lafayette.

In January, students braved the cold, ice, and snow to visit Niagara Falls. Their first stop was the Love Canal neighborhood, which has largely been abandoned since its construction on a toxic chemical site. The next stop was the Underground Railroad Museum, where students learned about the Cataract House's role in helping freedom seekers cross the border into Canada. Before returning to school, they visited the Falls to take in its breathtaking beauty.

Music Department Highlights

The first 20 weeks of school were a busy and educationally fulfilling time for our Cheektowaga Central band and choral ensembles. In September, Mrs. Williams welcomed 65 beginning band students into our program. They learned how to properly assemble, hold, and create a sound on their new instruments. We are sure there were many interesting sounds coming from households across the Town of Cheektowaga. The high school band started the year off "leading the charge" by performing at the home football games and pep rally, debuting a few new songs to accompany our new school mascot name.

October and November were busy times for a wide variety of students. Mrs. Santoro-Mol and her middle school musical students rehearsed for their production of Moana, while our new middle school general music teacher, Mr. Magowan, led a large and enthusiastic stage crew, where students learned how to build sets, run sound, and work as a team to manage the backstage area of the production. Our middle school and high school band and chorus members participated in a variety of honor ensembles, where they rehearsed and performed with advanced students from across WNY. These groups included the Buffalo State Honor Band and Chorus, NYSSMA JH Area All-State Band and Orchestra at Akron High School, and the NYSSMA HS Area All-State Band and Chorus at SUNY Fredonia.

Late November and December were filled with a variety of performances at all grade levels. The third- and fourth-grade choruses opened the Union East first trimester awards ceremonies by performing for parents and classmates. For third-grade students, this was their debut performance. A select group of fourth-graders were honored to be invited to perform for the Cheektowaga Senior Center Tree Lighting ceremony, featuring Scarlett Jeswald performing on her clarinet. The Middle School musical production of Moana was a rousing success, with three performances in front of a packed house of parents, friends, and family. Every chorus and band in grades 5-12 spread holiday cheer throughout the month at their annual holiday concerts. The High School band and chorus welcomed back around 30 alumni to perform a piece with them, including two who graduated in the early '80s. It is always great to catch up and learn about the amazing things our graduates are accomplishing.

Read Stop Write Program: Literacy in the Middle School

During the 2024-25 school year, professors from the University at Buffalo, including Dr. John Strong and Dr. Blythe Anderson, and Michigan State University, including Dr. Laura Tortorelli, have been collaborating with teachers to enhance literacy instruction for students in grades 4-9 at Union East Elementary, Central Middle, and Central High School. This initiative, called Read STOP Write, is designed to strengthen students' reading and writing skills.



Read STOP Write is an innovative approach that integrates foundational reading skills, comprehension, and writing instruction to help students engage with informational texts related to science and social studies topics, all aligned with grade-level standards. The project's ultimate goal is to boost students' reading achievement, focusing on reading fluency, comprehension, and a heightened motivation to read. Drs. Strong, Tortorelli, and Anderson have been working closely with teachers to support integrated literacy and content instruction, ensuring that students gain a deeper understanding of both reading and subject-specific content.

Putting Social-Emotional Learning into Action

Social and Emotional Learning (SEL) is a framework that helps students manage their emotions, set and achieve positive goals,



show empathy for others, build healthy relationships, and make responsible decisions. It plays a crucial role in a student's overall development. CCMS counselors have the responsibility to ensure all students' access to this essential learning by equipping them with the tools they need to manage emotions, set goals, and make thoughtful decisions. SEL prepares students for success at school, at home, and in their everyday lives.

This month, Mrs. Goc worked with her 5th and 6th graders to reflect on past choices and set goals for the remainder of the school year. This activity allowed students to evaluate both the positive and negative choices they made earlier in the year, while also setting goals to improve as they prepare for the next grade level.

Mrs. Dudas is focusing on empathy with her 7th graders. Her primary goal is to teach students that empathy means putting yourself in someone else's shoes and showing care for others, even if they haven't experienced the same situation. Students who practice empathy are less likely to engage in bullying, which helps reduce bullying incidents in schools.

Mrs. Schu helped her 5th graders discover their unique learning styles by administering a learning styles quiz. Students then used this information to identify strategies that could help them study more effectively. Mrs. Schu's 8thgrade students are learning how to reduce defensiveness and embrace constructive criticism as a way to grow and improve.

By incorporating SEL into the classroom, our counselors are fostering a supportive, reflective, and empathetic environment where students can thrive both academically and personally.

Cheektowaga Middle School

Care Program in the Middle School

Villa Maria College and Cleveland Play House are excited to bring CARE classes to Cheektowaga Central Middle School. CARE (Compassionate Arts Remaking Education) is a theatre education program that integrates principles from social-emotional learning, trauma-informed care, and evidence-based literacy practices for students in grades K-12. By utilizing theatre techniques and exercises, the program helps students build empathy, deepen their understanding of themselves and others, and equips them with valuable life skills. CARE classes are made possible through a grant from the U.S. Department of Education.

Each cycle, the CARE program visits every STACK class once during the 6-day rotation. The program incorporates a variety of activities, such as ELA concepts, writing exercises, monologues, creative group work, games, and student presentations, to explore and better understand





five core emotions. Over the course of the year, students will focus on fear, happiness, sadness, anger, and, of course, confidence. They will learn to recognize these emotions in themselves and others, while gaining techniques for communicating their feelings in a safe and effective way. The CARE program aims to enhance self-awareness, strengthen relationships between students and teachers, and contribute to improved academic progress.



A Message from the Principal

It is hard to believe that we are already halfway through the 2024-2025 school year. This year, we have focused on differentiated reading instruction throughout the building. All students are participating in an intervention aimed Principal

at building their skills as readers. As of our midyear testing, 50% of our students are achieving at or above grade level on the STAR assessment, an increase of 10% from the beginning of the school year. Kindergarten and second grade have shown the most growth, with 12% more students achieving at this level, which represents 65% of our kindergarten students! Our students are also assessed on their oral reading fluency, and each has grown in their fluency rate since September. We cannot wait to see how this improves throughout the second half of the school year.

In mathematics, our students are showing growth as well, with a 16% increase of students achieving at or above grade level at the midyear point. Our students are focused on building both their thinking skills and their understanding of mathematical concepts. As a staff, we have focused on the progression of skills across grade levels, being more cognizant of what students have learned in previous grades as well as what will be coming in subsequent years. This helps identify potential misconceptions and allows for a higher level of instruction. Our students are in good hands with the dedication of our teachers.


