Cheektowaga Central School District residents interested in serving on the Board of Education must complete a nominating petition and submit it no later than April 17, 2023 to the District Clerk or designee in the District Office located in the High School Building at 3600 Union Road, Cheektowaga, between the hours of 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. Nominating petitions are available on the district website at cheektowagak12.org or at the District Office between the hours of 8 a.m. and 3 p.m. At-large board seats carry a five-year term typically beginning July 1, pending special circumstances.

# **Seeking Election Workers**

The Cheektowaga Central School District has begun preparing for the 2023-24 budget and trustee election which will be held on Tuesday, May 16, 2023, and is seeking district residents to serve as poll workers for this vote. You are eligible to serve as a poll worker if you are a qualified voter and a resident of the Cheektowaga Central School District. District employees, school board members, relatives of board members or candidates are not prohibited from serving as election workers.

The hours are from 11 a.m. through the determination of the final results (typically 9:30 p.m.). In this paid (\$15.00/hr) role you will be responsible for:

- Preparing the polling place for voting
- Setting up the voting equipment
- Processing the voters
- Demonstrating voting procedures to the voters
- · Assisting voter if requested
- Closing the polling place
- Compiling and reporting the results



#### 5th Grade

- Explored patterns of Earth and sky by:
  - Utilizing digital SIMS to grasp concepts
  - Creating posters for constellations to determine which month(s) constellations are visible
  - Discussing the Earth's rotation and orbit around the sun
  - · Investigating the missing piece of an artifact with scientific reasoning to make inferences about the missing piece
- Investigating modeling matter by:
  - · Completing a chromatography investigation
  - Identifying the properties of matter
  - · Drawing diagrams to represent molecules

#### 6th Grade

- · Force and Motion
  - · Utilizing digital SIM to understand concepts of force and motion
  - · Understanding that a force is required to change the velocity of an object
  - Investigating how an object changes velocity depends on the direction of the force exerted on that object
  - · Investigating how the same strength force exerted on two different objects will cause each object to be affected differently
  - Understanding how mass and force affect a collision

#### 7th Grade

- · Studied the rock cycle and how the continents move
- · Learning how eclipses happen
  - · Models and simulations helped visualize the process
- Will be studying weather and climate changes
  - · What drives our weather?
  - How can Climate change impact our lives?

#### 8th Grade

- Learning the human body systems, how they interact and keep us healthy
- · Running a Metabolism simulator to see what the body needs
- · Learning how amino acids, glucose and oxygen keep the body running
- Will be studying genetics and how traits are passed on from generation to generation

# **Math Highlights**

Middle schoolers have been working hard this year to work together, solve problems and share strategies with their classmates and teachers.

#### 5th Grade

Fifth-grade students are working on multiplying and dividing fractions. They have also been finding the area of rectangles with fractional side lengths and comparing fractions. Students have learned to interpret a fraction as a quotient and are extending their understanding of multiplication of a whole number and a fraction through various models and hands-on activities.

#### 6th Grade

Students have been focusing on utilizing a variety of strategies to solve problems with precents and fractions. They've enjoyed getting to showcase their strategies and collaborate with their classmates while working on the walls.

#### 7th Grade

Seventh graders recently celebrated STAR growth for math and reading with a Glow Party. Math 7 is exploring the world of integers where students are learning how to add, subtract, multiply, and divide positive and negative numbers. Math 7 Honors students are investigating expressions and equations and are about to begin learning how to solve complex equations.

AIS students are practicing fact fluency where they are working on multiplication and division facts while learning new strategies to improve fact fluency. These skills will help students as they begin to work on integers.

Mrs. Clare's class continues to evaluate the "positives" and "negatives" as students work on calculations and real life examples using rational numbers. Temperature, bank accounts and measurement are only a few areas affected by rational numbers and are part of our everyday life.

# Math Highlights continued from page 4

#### 8th Grade

As a way to support students during a linear equations unit, AIS students are learning how solve equations using inverse operations. Currently they are working on equations that take one step to solve, then will be moving their way up to two-step equations and multi-step equations. These skills will help support their work on linear equations during their math class.

Eighth-grade math students have been graphing linear equations, and understanding what slope and y-intercept mean on a graph. The next unit of study will be solving algebraic equations.

# **Social Studies Highlights**

#### 5th Grade

Fifth-grade students are currently learning about the Mayan, Aztec and Inca cultures where they will be discovering the impact of Spanish exploration on the Aztec and Inca Empires.

Their next lesson will be on the early civilizations of Mesoamerica and South America.

Sixth grader Caden Dao used a clay tablet and a stylus to write Vietnamese symbols to recreate what he learned during a recent lesson on how the ancient Sumerians and Mesopotamians communicated.

#### **6th Grade**

Sixth-grade students recently finished the study of Mesopotamia and the Fertile Crescent and have now moved on to learning about Ancient Egypt. They're exploring the important people, places, things, events, and ideas that shaped this civilization. This unit of study will also cover the Ancient African Kingdoms of Kush, Ghana, Mali and Great Zimbabwe. Following our African studies we will move on to Asia, where students will be learning about Ancient India, the Indus Valley River Civilization, and the Yellow River Civilization of Ancient China.

#### 7th Grade

Seventh-grade students recently finished a project on the 13 colonies where students made storybooks about moving to the 13 colonies and settling on new land. Students are now beginning Unit 3, the American Revolution. Students said that they really enjoyed exploring the American Revolution and are looking forward to working on an enduring issues essay about the American Revolution.

#### 8th Grade

Eighth-grade students are studying the Industrial Revolution and the Progressive Era. This was a period of great change and challenges in the USA. New technologies, inventions, and ways of living and working dramatically transformed society; sometimes in good ways and sometimes in not so good ways. Next, students will be introduced to the enduring issue concept and will begin writing their enduring issues essays.

#### **VIP Luncheon**

A luncheon was held in December to celebrate Middle School Character Education and Way to Go Warrior winners. The theme for December's Character Education was "grateful". Way to Go Warriors were celebrated at the luncheon for their dedication to the 5 Bs and for demonstrating gratitude.

#### 8th Grade Honors Biology

- · Presentations about State **Lab-Making Connections**
- · Studying mitotic and meiotic cell division, DNA structure, and embryonic development
- · Creating models of cell processes





# **ELA Highlights**

Fifth- and sixth-grade teachers were recently trained in how to incorporate word work into the curriculum. These practices will begin to be implimented during reading and enrichment classes at both grade levels. Fifth graders have been working on nonfiction writing where students have created chapter books teaching and researching real-world topics. Sixth-grade students have been working on five paragraph literary essays about the characters in their books.

Seventh- and eighth-grade students have been working on narrative writing. Mrs. Orlowski said "Student writing grew exponentially as the classes worked on skills and strategies to improve their narrative stories".

STAR testing is around the corner and classes will begin working in small groups to focusing on target skills from the STAR testing data.





# Special Areas Highlights

#### **Physical Education**

During the second quarter, students participated in a variety of lead-up games such as team handball, weightlifting, swimming, basketball and fitness testing. Students also had the opportunity to partake in table tennis, thanks to a health grant purchase made by Mrs. Corigliano.

Students just wrapped up a lesson covering the human skeleton, muscles, and body systems. During these lessons, students engaged in a life-size skeleton. They're now beginning the nutrition unit where they'll learn how to help nourish the body.






#### Ms. Hallmark's Class 5th Grade

## **Polar Plunge**

On December 2, as part of Special Olympics New York Cool School Polar Plunge, high school students and staff jumped into the freezing waters of Lake Erie at Woodlawn Beach State Park. # **Boys Varsity Swim**


