In Mr. Cross' 10th Grade ELA, students wrapped up reading the novel "Speak" by Laurie Halse Anderson, and watching the film directed by Jessica Sharzer. They were then presented with the question "what don't you want to be silent about?" Students choose a topic that interests them, researched it and presented it to the class in a unique and meaningful way. They will have an opportunity to showcase their work to a broader audience at Youth Voices that will be held at Buffalo State University in May.







**AP Biology** students are digging into gene expression, which is crucial for correct organismal function & survival.

**Earth science** students are investigating different minerals and identifying their names based on differences in crystal structure, color, density, cleavage, or fracture.

**Forensics** students are learning all about fingerprints - identifying the general patterns in their own fingerprints using pencils and ink pads as well as practicing the techniques used to lift latent fingerprints.



In Ms. Aiken's Law Enforcement class, students have had the opportunity to establish connections with diverse Law Enforcement agencies in our Western New York region. Each Friday, a different representative from a Law Enforcement agency visits the class to elaborate on their professional journey, daily responsibilities, and share distinct experiences from their roles. Additionally, students have been granted the chance to visit the Cheektowaga Police Department, further enriching their understanding of the practical aspects of law enforcement.







In the wonderful world of Geometry, both regents and non-regents, we are working through skills that the students will be able to use in real life. Regents Geometry is working with quadrilaterals and the coordinate plane. While non- regents are finishing up with volume and moving into right triangles using the Pythagorean theorem and trigonometry. In their math lab we are taking time to reinforce skills that have been already taught to deepen the students' understanding using tools like Formative, Gimkit, and around the room activities where they get to work together cooperatively.











Spanish classes have been studying reflexive verbs and French classes have been learning about weather. Upper-level classes have been studying the future tense. They made New Year's resolutions about things they "will do" in 2024 and read authentic texts that feature the future tense, including song lyrics and classic poems.

French 4 students, Sara Thompson and Jaiden Block help each other learn their irregular future stems. Sometimes, in spite of all the technology, the "old fashioned way" works best!
