Students in English 10 are thinking about criminal justice as they read and perform Twelve Angry Men. Along the way, they are practicing their persuasive writing skills as they prepare to write their argumentative essay. In AP Literature, the students have become the teachers, designing, planning and teaching lessons on poetry from the Romantic Era.







Students in Life Math spent the past two weeks researching and analyzing scenarios having to do with purchasing a car. They compared specifications of new verses used vehicles and explored Kelley Blue Book and Edmunds. Students also calculated financing based on different denominations of down payments as well as different terms of a loan. Students presented their findings to their classmates. One student even purchased the car he researched!







Earth science students just finished studying moon phases. They started the topic by sketching "the Moon" to understand how a 3D object produces the 2D phases we observe (crescents, quarters, gibbous, etc.)





AP bio students designed and carried out an experiment to track the impact of a variable of their choosing on the rate of photosynthesis. The rate was tracked using disks of spinach that floated as oxygen was produced in the disks.



Students in Mr Skotnicki's class are in the final phases of building their balsa wood bridges. After break students will complete the final assembly and have the chance to test them for strength and durability.

In keeping with tradition, the World Language Department went all out this December! They created a countdown calendar which started right after Thanksgiving break, leading to Winter break. International Club students decorated ornaments with flags from various countries around the world. French 2 and 3 students watched a trilingual film (French/German/English) which depicted the true story of the Christmas Eve truce during World War I. In Spanish and French levels 4 and 5, students learned how to form the subjunctive in order to express obligation and made projects depicting all the things they had to do to prepare for their favorite holiday.







Students in Mr. Lee's Participation in Government classes are finishing up work on their required public policy paper. Each of Mr. Lee's students selected a public policy topic to research and write about. Some examples of topics being researched include gun control, the death penalty, artificial intelligence, abortion, and police body cameras. The paper is divided into four parts and the student's are currently writing part 4 in which they take a position on the topic and support their opinion with the research they completed in the first three parts of the paper.

Mr. Lee's seniors have had an opportunity to critically examine a number of different controversial and relevant topics throughout the course of the semester. This has allowed the students to discuss some of the challenges that face our nation today. The discussions were informative and helped seniors who are in the Government class develop their own opinion on many of these topics.



From Tuesday, January 23<sup>rd</sup> through Friday, January 26<sup>th</sup>, students should only attend school on the days and times that they are scheduled for an exam. Performance scores on local midterm assessments will be used in either the 2<sup>nd</sup> or 3<sup>rd</sup> marking period report card. There are no make-up dates for Regents Examinations. Make-up opportunities for local midterm assessments will not be provided, unless there are well-documented, extenuating circumstances that preclude students from attending on the original administration date.

The district will be providing bus transportation to and from school for all exams. Bus routes and schedules will be posted in student Google Classrooms and on the school web page.

- Morning buses will pick students up at the normal time for an 8am exam and around 11:00 am for afternoon exams as needed.
- Departure busses from school will be at 10:30am, 11:30am, 2:30pm & 3:30 pm
