**Earth Science** - Students are learning how Earth's rotation results in everyday occurrences like day/night and stars rotating around *Polaris* (the North Star).

Chemistry – Regent students have been learning about compounds and bonding, while AP students have engaged with intermolecular forces and are preparing solutions for further study using spectrophotometry!

**Biology** – Regent students have begun investigating group behavior and genetic relationships among African lion prides. AP students are learning about the biochemistry of aerobic cellular respiration.

**Physics** – Students have been learning about the forces of the universe, how they work in their daily lives and making calculations with these forces.



**Environmental Science** - Students are learning about everything ecology related. Recently, they researched different biomes from around the world and created posters to illustrate their favorite ones.

**Forensics** - Students have been working on comparing and analyzing handwriting samples using the 12 criteria that forensic scientists use in cases involving fraud and forgery.

**Medical Terms** – Students wrapped up the muscle unit by creating a physical therapy plan to tie the skeletal system and muscle system together.

Computer Science – Students have been working on learning C++ to make physical components of a circuit work. Recently they added a dimmer switch to control an LED.

**General Chemistry** – Students used an app called Seek to identify different plant species growing around the campus.




In Mrs. Baker's Life Math class, students are using SchoolAl to participate in a mock interview with a potential employer at Tim Hortons. In addition, they have been creating and perfecting their Resumes, and some have been using them when applying for jobs!



Students in Mrs. Hy's American History through Film class are working to create their own screenplays for a historical topic of their choosing. Student "directors" must make choices on camera shots, music, props and dialogue for each scene. They must also make the important decision of whether to focus on historical accuracy, entertainment...or both. Topic choices include Harriet Tubman, Japanese Internment, and the assassination of Abraham Lincoln.











In ELA Enrichment, 11th and 12th graders sharpened their critical thinking by solving a fictional wedding murder mystery. Using context clues and textual evidence, they pieced together motives, alibis, and clues to crack the case.

In a unit focused on students' right to free speech in schools, learners created compelling arguments, crafted claims and backed them up with evidence from real-world court cases, articles, and discussions.

These activities not only helped students prepare for their upcoming exam by reinforcing essential reading, writing, and critical thinking skills but also equipped them with tools they can use in real-life situations. By tackling relatable scenarios and collaborating creatively, students turned exam prep into a meaningful and fun experience.







Mr. Chasse's Global classes have embraced deepening, applying, and celebrating their learning through active, project-based activities. Global 10 kicked off the year by exploring the rich legacies of the Ottoman, Mughal, and Tokugawa Empires, diving deep into their characteristics and lasting contributions. They also examined the key beliefs of Enlightenment thinkers, exploring how their ideas shaped the modern world. Meanwhile, Global 09 students engaged in creative and insightful projects, including crafting advertisements for inventions from the Tang Song Dynasties, analyzing the rise of Genghis Khan and the Mongols, and constructing a visual representation of the social hierarchy in Feudal Japan. Through these hands-on assessments, students have not only deepened their understanding of these civilizations and cultures but also developed a greater appreciation for their contributions to the world today.

#### Deadlines for Admission

Morning Examinations - 10:00 a.m. Afternoon Examinations - 2:00 p.m.

From Tuesday, January 21<sup>st</sup> through Friday, January 24<sup>th</sup>, students should only attend school on the days and times that they are scheduled for an exam. Performance scores on local midterm assessments will be used in either the 2<sup>nd</sup> or 3<sup>rd</sup> marking period report card. There are no make-up dates for Regents Examinations. Make-up opportunities for local midterm assessments will not be provided, unless there are well-documented, extenuating circumstances that preclude students from attending on the original administration date.

The district will be providing bus transportation to and from school for all exams. Bus routes and schedules will be posted in student Google Classrooms and on the school web page.

- Morning buses will pick students up at the normal time for an 8am exam and around 11:00 am for afternoon exams as needed.
- Departure busses from school will be at 10:30am, 11:30am, 2:30pm & 3:30 pm
