

Students in Engineering have been tasked with a Catapult Design Challenge. Following the Design Process, the students had to research and come up with plans before building. In addition, they had to create a proposal and a budget with a spending cap. The Material List had them think not only about the materials needed, but the tools they would have to rent and the amount of time it would take them to build it as a labor cost. The students enjoyed trying to keep it under budget and being conscious of not wasting materials or time.







In Mrs. Bell's Algebra class, students were learning all about the differences between linear and exponential relationships. Each group created a poster showing a visual pattern and what relationship was illustrated while answering various questions about it.









Forensics students have been working on the techniques used to secure and process crime scenes, as well as how to properly package evidence.

Earth science students are in the middle of the mapping unit. Some classes just finished learning how to draw isolines, lines connecting equal value. Pictured below is student work of isolines showing ocean depth off of the island of Hawaii.

College Anatomy spent a week during breast cancer awareness month studying the genes that cause different types of cancers throughout the human body. Students looked at patient data of different tumors and compared the mutated genes. This brought a thorough discussion to the class about how many genes are related to cancer in the body and the similarities and differences in tumors.

AP bio students are learning about the details of cell organelles.


















French 2 & 3 classes created presentations on their "animaux favoris". It was a fun way to review lots of vocabulary and adjectives while working on presentational speaking skills.

- Wrestling






