Students in Mrs. McCormack's 9th grade class have read and analyzed several short stories this year. They are now taking all of the tools they've learned to write an original short story. Math and Foods Budget Battle



In the beginning of November, many world cultures celebrate those that are deceased. Dia de los Muertos is a lively celebration that originated in Mexico. La Toussaint is celebrated in Francophone countries and has roots dating back to the middle ages. Students researched and wrote biographies of famous historical figures.





Spanish 2 students created their own Catrina dolls in observance of el Día de los Muertos. La Catrina is a reminder to enjoy life and embrace mortality.





Mrs. Crumlish's Studio in Art classes competed in a "Hand Turkey" Challenge where they turned their hand into an IMMENSELY creative turkey with prizes for the two most creative. Ceramic classes worked on coil pot constructions, while Mrs. Forte's Advanced classes worked on abstract self-portraits.









Students enjoyed the beauty of the Art-Deco architecture of Buffalo City Hall and rode the original elevator to the observation deck to get a panoramic view of downtown Buffalo. Then they had an opportunity to see the McKinley Monument, which was built in honor of President McKinley who was assassinated in Buffalo at the Pan-American Expo. On the way to the Buffalo History Museum we stopped at the Theodore Roosevelt Inauguration Site on Delaware Ave. This home is where Roosevelt was sworn in as President of the United States after McKinley died. At the Buffalo History Museum, students saw artifacts from some of the greatest moments in Western New York sports history. We also viewed exhibits from the Continuum, which is the history of Erie county dating back a thousand years.
